




This 1853 mansion was renovated and a gallery added in the Italianate style in 1871 to house the private art collection of Judge and Mrs. E. B. Crocker. The gallery boasted the largest private art collection in the country, and held more paintings than the Metropolitan Museum of Art. The complex was donated to the City of Sacramento in 1884, and a large new gallery by Gwathmey Siegal and Associates was added in 2010. The Crocker Art Museum is the oldest public art museum west of the Mississippi River.




The Intake Structure located on the Sacramento River has two main functional requirements: to supply water at a capacity of 160 million gallons per day and to ensure the associated fish screens would safeguard aquatic life. The design team created a structure that gave Sacramento a new river landmark. The structure, an iconic dragonfly symbol that represents Sacramento's relationship with its rivers, has won numerous design awards.


LODI ANIMAL SERVICES BUILDING




The Lodi Animal Shelter is getting a major upgrade with a brand-new 12,000-square-foot facility! Drawing inspiration from the area's industrial and agricultural vibes, the building will feature exposed steel, wood-like panels, and a welcoming glass entry. Inside, you'll find cozy spaces for dogs, cats, and even exotic animals, along with offices, a vet clinic, and a multi-use room. Outside, there are dog exercise yards, and a dog run area, and an outdoor overflow area from the multiuse room—everything needed to make life better for both animals and their future families. Fun Fact: This brand-new 12,000-square-foot facility is currently under construction and will replace the old, undersized shelter to better serve the community and its furry friends.



Built in 1931, the Blue Anchor Building was home to the California Fruit Exchange until 1966. It is one of the world's largest deciduous fruit marketing collaborative. Made of steel and concrete and faced in plaster with a red tile roof, it was designed in the Spanish Colonial Revival Style and is on the National Register of Historic places. It now houses the Office of Land Use and Climate Innovation.



The office is on the Cultural and Historic Register. It was designed by James C. Dodd, Sacramento's first African-American licensed architect. This building, known as the Colley Office, is a good example of Dodd's mid-century modern architectural style and showcases his unique signature pattern of masonry. Nathaniel S. Colley, Sacramento's first black lawyer, successfully fought against segregation in politics, education, and housing. The office currently houses the Sacramento Black Chamber of Commerce.



Shiloh Baptist Church was James Dodd's first major architectural commission. The church was completed in 1963 and is on the National and California Register of Historic Places. Shiloh Baptist Church has ties back to 1856. After losing their past churches to church burnings and moves dictated by the Sacramento Housing and Redevelopment Agency, church members found the property on 9th Street and 36th Street. Church members asked James Dodd to design their new space. The church was completed with volunteer assistance. This building is another example of mid-century modern architecture with the unique roof line and geometric stained glass windows.


